



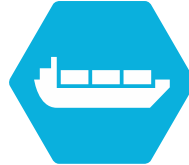
Key Facts About New Hampshire's Infrastructure

15 public-use airports in New Hampshire



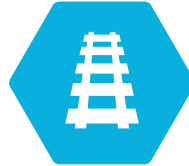
\$103.56 million of unmet needs for its parks system

2,479 bridges, 10.9% of which were structurally deficient in 2017



2.8 million short tons of cargo in 2014, ranking it #39 nationally

There are 657 dams in New Hampshire, 151 of which are high-hazard potential. Of the high-hazard potential dams, 93% have an Emergency Action Plan



354 miles of rail across the state, ranking #47 by mileage nationally

\$1.01 billion in drinking water infrastructure needs over 20 years



16,156 miles of public roads, with 25% in poor condition. Each motorist pays \$526 per year in costs from driving on roads in need of repair

20 sites on the Superfund National Priorities List



\$324 million gap in estimated school capital expenditures in New Hampshire

10 of inland waterways, ranking #36 nationally



4,211,578 annual unlinked passenger trips via transit systems including bus, transit, and commuter trains in 2017

3 miles of levees in New Hampshire in the National Levee Database



\$1.98 billion in wastewater infrastructure needs over 20 years
